A refugee is someone who has been forced to flee their home country due to war, violence, persecution, or natural disaster. If they are resettled in the U.S., they may arrive with limited access to resources and disrupted educational backgrounds.

- Hand sanitizer
- Deodorant
- Shampoo and conditioner

- Winter hat
- Winter coat
- Socks
- Gloves or mittens
- Scarves
- Blankets

# **Welcome Home Kits**

- Pots and pans
- Towels and wash cloths
- Bed sheets and pillowcases
- Shower curtain
- Cleaning products
- Dish soap and sponges
